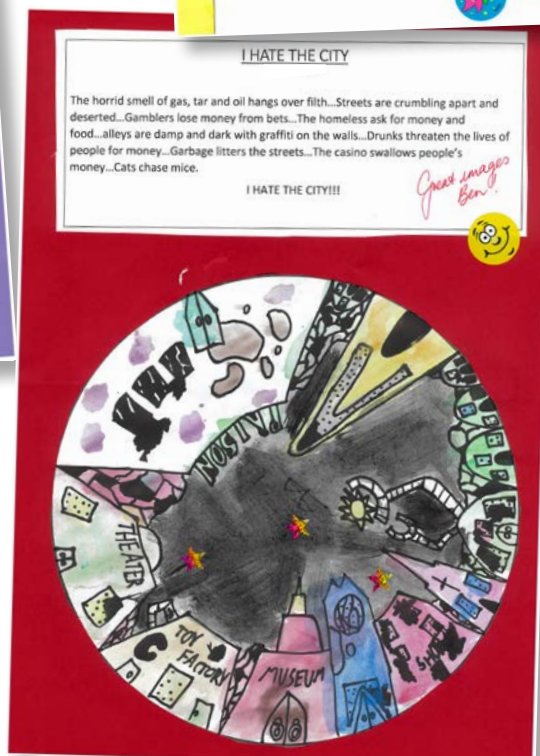
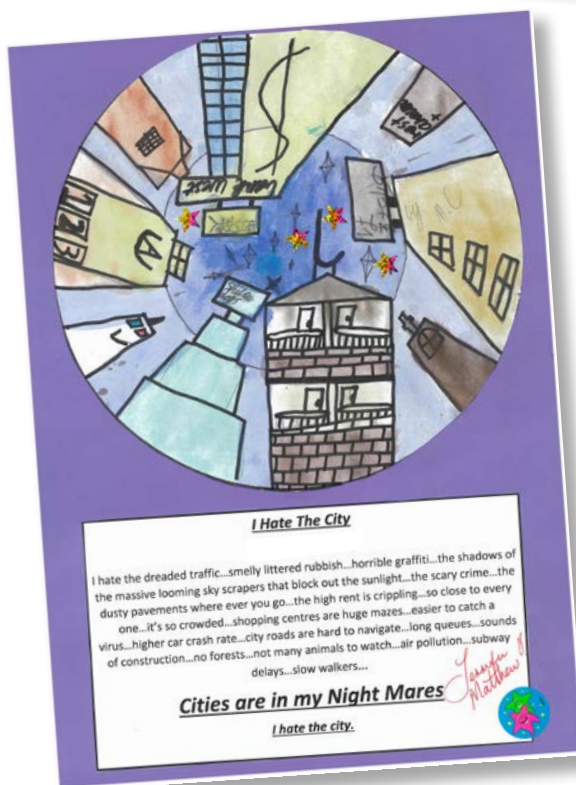
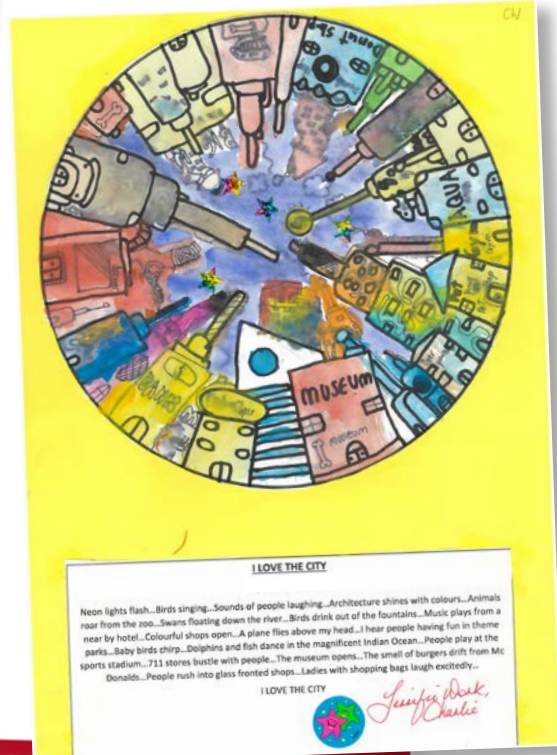
Do you love or hate cities?

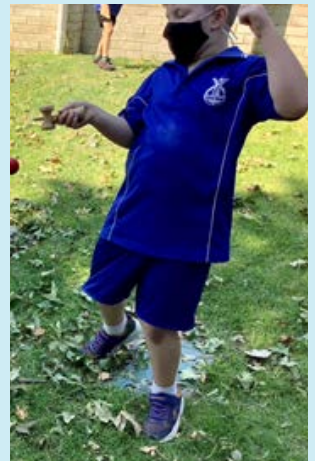

Nine-year-old Bunbury BMX Club member Jacob Reed enjoyed a very successful day out competing in Round 2 of the Western Australian 2022 AusCycling BMX State Series on March 6.

What are BMX bikes?

Bikes that you can race on and do racing competitions on. They have thinner tyres and bigger wheels than a park bike.

What is the difference between BMX racing and freestyle BMX, and which type do you do?

For freestyle BMX, you can ride a park bike. You can do flips and tricks, but you can't do that on a racing bike. You also can't use a park bike for racing. I do both but only compete in BMX racing at the moment.

What do you wear when BMX riding?

You wear protective pants, a long-sleeve shirt that has your number and name on it, protective gloves and a full-face helmet.

What sort of freestyle BMX tricks do you do?

I can do flips and turns in the air.

This fortnight we finished our exploration of the ocean and have begun to explore various famous artists and their techniques. We started off the artist study by exploring Jackson Pollock and his flick and drip art style. The children seemed to find his techniques fascinating and enjoyed flicking the paint across their pages. We also explored unusual colour application methods such as bubble paintings and the use of spray bottles which really inspired the children to create some beautiful artworks.

Last week we also celebrated Harmony Week and St Patrick's Day at OSHClub with many inclusive and diversity based experiences being included in our program. The most popular experience has been the sun catcher clovers as well as exploring different songs, dances and games from around the world. We also created some handprint flags that will be displayed in our room.

During the past few weeks, we have also had a heavy focus on personal hygiene and cough and sneeze etiquette. To keep the children engaged during these topics we have done some fun experiments and demonstrations such as using a spray bottle filled with coloured water to showcase how far a cough or sneeze can travel.
